Labor Council Adopts Resolutions Calling On Post-Gazette To Settle Fair Contracts With Striking Union Members

The Beaver-Lawrence Central Labor Council has adopted a resolution calling on the Pittsburgh-Post Gazette to settle fair contracts with the News Guild of Pittsburgh, CWA Mailers, Pittsburgh Typographical Union, Pressmen and Teamsters. The resolution was adopted by the Labor Council at its December

membership meeting on December 19th.

The resolution urges Labor Council delegates, affiliated organiza-

tions, community allies Post-Gazette subscriptions until the strike ends and to read the strike publication, the Pittsburgh Union Progress, at unionprogress.com, Twitter@PUPNews and Instagram@pghunionprogress.

The resolution also authorized the Labor Council to sign on to the Post-Gazette Solidarity Pledge. Signatories of the Pledge commit to:

*Not speak with the Post-Gazette until the strikers' demands (listed below) are met;

*Ask union members and community organizations and networks to subscribe to the Pittsburah Union Progress:

*Ask union members and community organizations to cancel Post signed resolution to the -Gazette subscriptions until the strikers' demands solidarity rally in downare met.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BEAVER-LAWRENCE CENTRAL LABOR COUNCIL URGING BLOCK COMMUNICATIONS. TO SETTLE A FAIR CONTRACT WITH THE NEWSPAPER GUILD OF PITTSBURGH, CWA MAILERS, PITTSBURGH TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION, PRESSMENN, AND TEAMSTERS, REPRESENTING THE WORKERS AT THE PITTSBURGH POST-GAZETTE

WHEREAS, the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette is a nationally renowned newspaper with more than a century of public service and the most important news source in Southwestern Pennsylvania; and

WHEREAS, historically the Post-Gazette has attracted talented employees from across Southwest Pennsylvania and beyond to work in its newsroom, its ad sales department, and at its printing plant; and

WHEREAS, those employees have become a vital part of their communities; and

WHEREAS, the employees of the Post-Gazette are represented by the Newspaper Guild of Pittsburgh, CWA Mailers, Pittsburgh Typographical Union, Pressmen and Teamsters; and

WHEREAS, the Post-Gazette has chosen to be represented by a notorious union busting law firm from Nashville, Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, the newsroom's labor agreement expired in 2017 and the company illegally imposed conditions on the newsroom employees in 2020, then illegally canceled the health insurance for press workers, production workers and advertising workers at the end of September 2022; and

WHEREAS, the unions have called for subscription and advertising boycotts; and

WHEREAS, the workers have demanded that Post-Gazette management rescind the illegally imposed unilateral working conditions, restore the status quo set by the terms of the 2014-17 TNG collective bargaining agreement, return to the table to bargain in good faith for a successor agreement and restore health care coverage for press workers, production and advertising workers; and

WHEREAS, the Company's actions are doing great damage to both the employees, who are members of our western Pennsylvania community, and to the reputation of the newspaper; and

WHEREAS, the unions have bargained in good faith; and

WHEREAS, the Union Movement and its political and community allies have expressed unwavering support for the workers at the Post-Gazette and have spoken out against Block Communication's unfair and destructive actions and demands.

WHEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED:

That the Beaver-Lawrence Central Labor Council hereby urges Block Communication to return to the bargaining table and negotiate fair contracts that will maintain the excellence of the Post-Gazette; and

That the Beaver-Lawrence Central Labor Council hereby urges its delegates, affiliated organizations, community allies and friends to cancel their Post-Gazette subscriptions until the strike ends and to read the strike publication, the Pittsburgh Union Progress, at unionprogress.com, Twitter @The PUPNews and Instagram@pghunionprogress; and
