California Civil Code §1954 requires that you provide me with at least 24-hours written notice prior to entering my home. Entry is only allowed for certain reasons, such as to make necessary repairs or in case of an emergency. Your notice should include the date, approximate time, and purpose for your entry.

Entry in violation of *California Civil Code* §1954 is a trespass. Additionally, the law provides that a "landlord may not abuse the right of access or use it to harass the tenant." *California Civil Code* §1954(c). *

Please comply with your obligations and provide me with adequate notice prior to entering my home.
