City of Tucson Resource Guide for Immigrant Families, December 2016

Following the harsh language and statements regarding immigration in the 2016 presidential campaign, we understand that many immigrant families are currently experiencing high levels of anxiety and fear. We know these can be difficult times, but Tucson is committed to doing everything we can do to ensure that as residents of our city, you feel safe and valued. As an Immigrant Welcoming City, we will stand united and protect one another.

The following information was compiled by Tucson in partnership with community stakeholders to guide you and your family in the coming weeks and months.

WHAT TO DO: FOUR KEY POINTS

1. First and foremost, DO NOT PANIC

- Right now, nothing has changed. All existing immigration benefits remain in existence.
- We can't predict what will happen after President-Elect Trump assumes office in January. But the City of Tucson and our partners are committed to continuing to provide the community with information and resources as more information becomes available.

2. Know Your Rights and Report Incidents

All people in our city, regardless of immigration status, have rights under the law.

 - o Call 911 if you or your family has been a victim of crime

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o Know that the Tucson Police Department is committed to protecting victims without regard to immigration status. Current TPD policy states: "victims and witnesses of crime should not be the focus of immigration inquiries" and "When officers interact with persons who are not suspected of committing a violation of state or local law, officers have no authority to take action based upon suspicion about immigration status. In fact, our members are under orders to release people who have committed no state or local criminal violations."

3. Know your LEGAL OPTIONS

- Legal screenings are critical: Talk to an attorney and know your immigration options. Many undocumented immigrants and DACA recipients may be eligible for permanent immigration status based on a range of circumstances including if they are:
 - o Victims of serious crimes, including domestic violence and trafficking
 - o People who fear persecution or torture in their home countries
 - o Minors who have been abandoned, abused or neglected by one or both parents
 - o Family members of U.S. citizens and legal permanent residents
- Consult a qualified attorney or BIA-accredited representative:
 - o Look for an attorney online www.immigrationadvocates.org/nonprofit/legaldirectory/
 - o See the community legal resource guide, below
- Beware of "notaries" offering legal advice or bad attorneys making false promises: Some individuals may try to take advantage of you. Seek legal consultations from reputable organizations or legal service providers that you know are trustworthy.
 - o Report fraud to the State Bar of Arizona's Attorney/Consumer Assistance Program 1(800) 319-0514 x7280
- **Do not sign an immigration document without legal advice**: you have a right to seek legal advice and understand the document before signing it. Do not let anyone force you to sign a document, especially a deportation order.
- Organize your documents. It is helpful to have identity documents, children's birth certificates, and other vital documents in one place. If you have lived in this country for more than two years, create a packet of documents that show you have been a member of the U.S. community and are not a recent arrival.
- If you are a legal permanent resident, become a citizen!
