Organizing for Power

1 WHEREAS:

- 2 Privatization and budget cuts are threatening public and social services like never before from
- 3 vital services that protect clean water to public safety and health services. These attacks aim to
- 4 destroy our collective bargaining rights, bust our unions, silence worker advocacy, eliminate
- 5 living wage jobs and cut vital services in our communities. We are fighting these attacks every
- 6 single day; and

7 WHEREAS:

- 8 Through AFSCME Strong, Oregon AFSCME leaders have mobilized at the local level and
- 9 engaged thousands of members and workers to take an active role in forging our future and
- 10 improving standards in our core public service industries; and

11 WHEREAS:

12 Nationally, we have organized 500,000 new members into the union; and

13 WHEREAS:

- 14 Unorganized public service and private sector workers all over the country are ready to fight
- 15 back and achieve the standards that AFSCME unions have won, and AFSCME is the union
- 16 where they belong; and

17 WHEREAS:

- 18 Now, more than ever, members of independent unions see that we are stronger together. Since
- 19 AFSCME Strong began, over 10,000 members of independent unions joined AFSCME to fight
- 20 back and win; and

21 WHEREAS:

- With 40,000 AFSCME workers in behavioral health nationwide, 5,000 of whom are in Oregon,
- 23 we have the power to raise professional standards in the industry and improve services for
- 24 millions of people with mental illness or substance abuse disorders by bringing the union to
- 25 hundreds of thousands of unorganized behavioral health professionals; and

26 WHEREAS:

- 27 AFSCME currently represents more than 300,000 health care employees, but six million
- 28 unorganized hospital workers do not have the power of a union. AFSCME members can
- 29 organize these workers and fight alongside them to improve healthcare across our country; and

31 WHEREAS:

- 32 We must refocus on organizing workers in these core AFSCME industries as the only path
- 33 forward to building density and power, protecting the quality of these vital services for our
- 34 communities and winning rights for public sector workers and respect for public services.

35 THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- 36 That we must reach out to the thousands of unorganized, emergency and health industry
- workers who, by joining us, can help level the playing field for public service workers; and

38 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

- 39 That we will organize workers in behavioral health, the substance abuse and treatment industry,
- 40 hospitals, and other social services along with other public sector and privatized public service
- 41 workers. In addition, we will seek to affiliate independent public service unions to bring them into
- 42 AFSCME; and

43 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

- That as a Council, we will work with trained activists and members to identify growth
- 45 opportunities with unorganized workers, many of whom they work with side-by-side, and

46 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**:

47 That Oregon AFSCME will put staff and member resources into external organizing; and

48 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**:

- 49 That Oregon AFSCME will provide Volunteer Member Organizers (VMOs) to support other
- 50 affiliates that are organizing; and

51 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**:

- 52 That Oregon AFSCME will leverage existing relationships to secure labor peace agreements,
- 53 neutrality policies and expedited recognition procedures; and

54 **BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**:

- 55 Oregon AFSCME will prioritize external organizing while remaining committed to AFSCME
- 56 STRONG. We will grow our VMO team, increase our membership and raise standards across
- 57 Oregon and the rest of the country in our fight for economic justice, dignity and respect for all
- working people.
