Preserving Exclusive Representation

1 WHEREAS:

- 2 The U.S. Supreme Court dealt all workers and the public sector labor movement a serious blow
- 3 in its decision in Janus vs. AFSCME Council 31; and

4 WHEREAS:

- 5 Oregon AFSCME had been preparing for an adverse ruling in *Janus* for many years and
- 6 strengthened our union by reconnecting with our members, engaging in organizing campaigns,
- 7 developing systems to recruit and maintain membership, and enlisting the support of political
- 8 leaders and allies; and

9 WHEREAS:

- Anti-union groups are seeking to seize on Janus by launching well-funded campaigns to
- 11 persuade our members to quit their union. These groups seek to silence the voice of workers as
- 12 they pursue their ultimate goal: the elimination of exclusive representation in the public sector;
- 13 and

14 WHEREAS:

- 15 Exclusive representation means the duly chosen union is the sole voice for all workers and
- 16 source of worker power. It is the basis on which our union is organized and the way we bargain
- 17 for meaningful change. Through the process of collective bargaining and exclusive
- 18 representation, AFSCME members earn fair wages, safe and reasonable working conditions,
- 19 job security, health benefits that cover us when we are sick, and retirement benefits that provide
- 20 us with dignity as we age; and

21 WHEREAS:

- 22 The Supreme Court has ruled in several separate cases over many decades, including most
- 23 recently in Janus, that the right of exclusive representation comes with the obligation to
- 24 represent all members covered by our contracts fairly and without discrimination. This obligation
- is known as the duty of fair representation; and

26 WHEREAS:

- 27 Anti-union advocates deceptively claim that unions should not be required to represent non-
- 28 members. Their true motivation is not fairness to dues paying union members: it is to erode the
- 29 power of workers and undermine exclusive representation; and

32 WHEREAS:

- Dividing the workforce into "us" versus "them," even on the vital question of union membership,
- 34 will inevitably erode our strength and undermine our legitimacy as the EXCLUSIVE
- 35 representative. We cannot allow anti-union forces to divide workers. AFSCME supports the duty
- of fair representation, recognizing its importance for worker solidarity, maintaining our power,
- 37 and achieving our collective aspirations for ourselves and our communities.
- 38 WHEREAS:
- 39 Refusing to represent non-members or charging non-members fees for services will undermine
- 40 our exclusive representative status and the power we need to realize our aspirations; and

41 WHEREAS:

- 42 The notorious anti-union group, the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC), has drafted
- a model bill to abolish the duty of fair representation and exclusive representation, and with
- 44 Janus decision author Justice Alito's encouragement, union-busting lawyers have filed lawsuits
- 45 seeking to achieve these ends; and

46 WHEREAS:

47 Although our union could not control the outcome of *Janus*, we can control our response to it.

48 THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- 49 That Oregon AFSCME Council 75 will continue to support exclusive representation and the duty
- of fair representation, and will oppose efforts that undermine the union's status as a
- 51 democratically, member-run exclusive representative of bargaining units; and

52 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

- 53 That Oregon AFSCME shall not support or promote legislation, policies or changes to collective
- 54 bargaining agreements which would allow members-only collective bargaining agreements or
- 55 otherwise support the elimination of exclusive representation, nor shall Oregon AFSCME allow
- an employer to reduce the wages of represented employees, without employee authorization, to
- pay a union for the costs of representation, including direct subsidies to the union as a
- 58 substitute for dues or fair-share fees; and

59 **BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED**:

- 60 That Oregon AFSCME shall provide information and education to members, allies and political
- 61 leaders on the vital importance of maintaining exclusive representation and objecting to direct
- 62 payments by employers to the union, and the union shall prioritize educating our members on
- these issues.
