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This survey is based on 2,149 interviews conducted by YouGov on the internet of registered voters residing in the states of Arizona, Georgia, Iowa, Kansas, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, and Wisconsin. The full sample was weighted according to gender, age, race/ethnicity, education, and 2020 Presidential vote choice based on the American Community Study, Current Population Survey Voting and Registration Supplement, and 2020 turnout estimates. The sample was then subsetted to respondents who report living in a rural area, and the weights were then re-centered. Respondents were selected from YouGov to be representative of registered voters residing in rural areas in the states of Arizona, Georgia, Iowa, Kansas, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, and Wisconsin. The weights range from 0.17 to 6.08 with a mean of 0.99 and a standard deviation of 0.59.

The margin of error (a 95\% confidence interval) for a sample percentage $p$ based upon the subsetted sample is approximately $2.5 \%$. It is calculated using the formula:

where $C V$ is the coefficient of variation of the sample weights and $n$ is the sample size used to compute the proportion. This is a measure of sampling error (the average of all estimates obtained using the same sample selection and weighting procedures repeatedly). The sample estimate should differ from its expected value by less than margin of error in 95 percent of all samples. It does not reflect non-sampling errors, including potential selection bias in panel participation or in response to a particular survey.
